2017 NCAPD Oral Health Service Award Presented to Frank Courts



Frank J. Courts (1978), a private practitioner from Rocky Mount, NC, was recognized as the 2018 NCAPD Oral Health Service Award Winner. This Award "recognizes individuals for outstanding achievements in pediatric oral health in North Carolina, including those who have demonstrated exceptionally strong records of advocacy for children's oral health in the state". A native of Reidsville, NC Frank is a four-time UNC-CH alumnus. He graduated from college and dental school at Carolina before completing his certificate in pediatric dentistry in 1978 and PhD in virology in the School of Medicine in 1980. He spent 22 years of his career in academia at the University of Florida,

where he served for 16 years as a highly respected department chair with an enviable record of scholarship and grant acquisitions. Frank has been a practice owner in Rocky Mount, NC since 2002. He joined the leadership ranks of the NCAPD soon after his arrival back "home". From 2008-17 he provided yeoman's guidance, leadership, and service as the Dental Chair of the NC Physician's Advisory Committee, the state's top level Medicaid advisory panel. He is the co-leader of an ongoing campaign (2014-date) to improve NC Dental Medicaid fees. Frank has served on the NCAPD Board of Directors for four years and was recently elected to serve as President for 2019. Frank's unique early career background in health service research and experience as an Eastern North Carolina solo practitioner for much of his practice career combine to undergird him with enormous wisdom in advocating for the oral health needs of North Carolina children. He is passionate in his advocacy efforts and has shown amazing energy—we are richly blessed to have one with Frank's indefatigable spirit as a champion-advocate for children. > Our third-year residents are on the final stretch to complete their research projects and defend their master's degrees. Anne Baker is working with Jessica Lee and Ray White (Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery) to conduct a randomized clinical trial investigating the efficacy of buffered local anesthetics. Ivy Brisbin is working with Tim Wright to investigate families' perspectives regarding treatment with silver diamine flouride. Erin Tilton is working with Martha Ann Keels on an investigation of the interface between nutrition and early childhood caries.

DDS Student Travel Award Announced!

Pediatric dentistry faculty have a long history of mentoring and collaborating with dental student investigators. Examples of dental student research areas include basic/applied biomaterials, growth and development, dental trauma prevention/treatment, pediatric health services, mineralized tissues, dental education, prenatal/infant oral health, fluoride therapies, fluorosis, breast-feeding, genetics, oral epidemiology, eating disorders, conscious sedation and general anesthesia. In addition to generating scores of peer-reviewed publications, our student-faculty collaborations have supported the development of new clinical guidelines, treatment protocols, programmatic innovations, and oral health policy.

Dental student investigators often have presented their research findings at local, national and international forums, culminating in numerous and highly competitive awards. These include the James Bawden Student Research Award, Derek T. Turner Student Research Awards, Albert Schweitzer Fellowships; AADR/IADR Bloc Travel Grant, AADR Student Research Fellowship and AADR/IADR Hatton Awards. Dental student investigators have been invited to present at ADA Annual Meetings in the ADA/Dentsply Student Clinician Research Program, the Hinman Student Research

Symposium, and the AADR/IADR Caulk Dentsply Competition. Many of these collaborations have assisted student researchers in earning *graduation* with distinction honors.

In the past, dental students have supported their faculty-mentored research with fellowship awards from the now defunct UNC Pfeiffer Research Program, as well as with School of Dentistry and DDS Short-term Research Fellowships. Increasingly, student research interest in children's oral health has outpaced available funding options. For this reason, the Department has developed and launched a fund in the Dental Foundation of North Carolina (DFNC) to support future DDS research in children's oral

health. Many of our previous dental student investigators are supporting this fund. Thank you! Thank you!

The award, first given in 2018 to **Abby Becherer** (DDS 2018) and named to honor former DDS researcher and fund benefactor Jon J. Wendell, (DDS 1988) is aimed to support a travel grant to underwrite travel expenses for a departmentmentored dental student investigator to present their research at a national meeting. To honor another former DDS researcher and fund benefactor, the 2019 recipient will be the Trevor Jensen Travel Award Recipient in Pediatric Dentistry. Trevor is a 2007 graduate of the UNC - CH School of Dentistry. He received a DDS Research Fellowship and the James Bawden Research Award for his work with Rocio Quinonez (2000) on "Innovating infant or al health initiatives for pre-doctoral education," now known as the Baby Oral Health Program (bOHP). After graduation, Trevor completed a residency in pediatric dentistry at Utah Children's Medical Center in Salt Lake City. He then moved to Arizona where he built a practice in Mesa and Gilbert. Trevor is married to Brooke and has four children.

The 2019 Trevor Jensen Travel Award Recipient in Pediatric Dentistry is Meagan Inclan (DDS 2019). Meagan's mentor is Beau Meyer (2017) and her research topic is "New graduate preparedness to treat patients with special healthcare needs." The results of her research will be presented at the upcoming UNC-CH Research Day and the IADR/AADR/ CADR meeting in Vancouver, Canada in June. Meagan is conducting interviews with dental school administrators across the country to develop an instrument for a survey to be used among recent dental school graduates. Ultimately, her research will provide an in-depth understanding of the ramifications of the recently revised CODA standards for predoctoral education regarding care of individuals with special health care needs.
