White Coat Wednesday

The North Carolina Pediatric Society held their annual white coat day with the state legislators on June 2, 2021. They again, graciously, invited the pediatric dentistry community to join them. This event is usually held in Raleigh but this year had to be held virtually. We had a good pediatric dentistry representation with Martha Ann Keels, Gentry Byrd, Bryan Cobb, Dave Olson, Miranda Kalaskey, Kristal Tucker and Mike Roberts in attendance.

After all participants were introduced, the meeting began with an Issues Briefing by the pediatric lobbyists Chris Hollis and Josh Lanier of C.S. Hollis and Associates. This was followed by the group observing a live Health and Human Services Appropriation Hearing with play-by-play commentary lifting up key points and addressing questions in real time. The group then met with Legislative member Rep. Carla Cunningham, Democrat from District 106, Mecklenburg to discuss issues of mutual interest. A short wrap-up and debriefing concluded the event.

Much thanks goes to Martha Ann Keels for arranging for our participation. The NC Pediatric Society leadership were most welcoming and are our strong allies in promoting total health, including oral health, for the children of North Carolina.

Ted Oldenburg—a Remembrance

When “TO” left us in April, it was a stunning shock. His health was good and only a few days shy of his 89th birthday, he was fit and always working on being fitter. He often commented that the one thing he did not like about his Cedars Retirement Community was that “everyone was so old”. His healthy appearance and youthful mind-set left me with the impression that in his case, “89 was the new 69” and that he might outlive most everyone around. No one expected he might leave us so suddenly.

Ted was a native of Muskegon, MI who grew up in Signal Mountain, TN. He graduated from Davidson College and UNC School of Dentistry. After a stint in the USAF in Honolulu, he returned to his alma mater in Chapel Hill and completed the graduate program in pediatric dentistry. He and Weezie then settled into a lifetime that spanned another 58 years in Chapel Hill.

Although it is hard to imagine Ted as a small fish in a big pond, picture this—his first dean was UNC’s founding dean and first AAPD President (1947) and ABPD Founder, Dean John Brauer. Ted also answered to John’s Brauer’s right-hand man, the Executive Associate Dean, much beloved and highly respected mentor/teacher, Willie Demeritt. Ted took over the Chair-reigns from Roy Lindahl, then a luminary in specialty leadership circles. Not long after Ted became Chair, Jim Bawden became his boss as UNC’s second Dean. Even considering this distinguished cast of superiors, there is no indication Ted was ever intimidated—probably because he got so much respect and support for those under whom he served.

His 16 years as Chair saw meteoric growth of the specialty, both inside and outside the school of dentistry. Ted was a mover-and-shaker in both arenas and always an articulate and unapologetic advocate for children’s oral health. As a faculty member and leader within the halls of Brauer, a review of his CV is humbling. If you looked up outstanding institutional citizen in the dictionary, you see him pictured there. Quote me on this observation—he was a statesman-leader, perhaps the most diplomatic person I have known. He held strong opinions but was not overly opinionated. He knew how to disagree without being disagreeable. He was a masterful consensus-builder—that may have been one of his most defining characteristics.

Observing him in his administrative role was like attending formal leadership training at Kellogg or Wharton. Watching him in action was a gift for which all under his tutelage owe a huge debt of gratitude for the role model he was. As one example of this gift he possessed, at one time his small faculty included two future chairs, a former dean, and two future deans, one of whom would become a major university president. There were many egos in the room. As our leader, Ted was a master-orchestrator who not only kept us on the same page—he led us forward to many new heights. He had a tremendous impact on the children in NC through his mentorship for so many of us and his advocacy/vision for children’s oral health issues.

He was also a terrific and effective leader/diplomat on the national stage. Highly respected by peers across the country, his obituary mentions he was a prodigious national leader. That he was. A founder and early president of the NCPAD, he also served as president of the Southeastern Society of Pediatric Dentistry. He was a longtime leader in both the ABPD and AAPD, the preeminent organizations in our specialty. Folks generally pursue a leadership trajectory in one or the other and although a few individuals have served the leadership ranks of both, this is quite rare because even if one can please both constituencies, it usually requires the dedication of 7-10 years to each organization. Ted was not only President of both organizations—he did so simultaneously and is the only one ever to do so, extending his impact on children’s oral health to every corner of the US and beyond.

One of Ted’s lasting gifts not intuitively obvious in considering his legacy is the intuition he had for recruitment and faculty development. He knew something about human capital, how to invest in it, and how to nurture it to flourish.

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Of all his legacies, one closest to his heart was his family. When he retired after 52 years as an active faculty member, our paths in the schoolhouse no longer crossed but we would have lunch together often. Even this past year during the pandemic, we broke rules and met on occasion for coffee. We talked a lot. We talked about a little of everything; however, talk of his family always put him in the best mood. He was proud of Weezie's (still ongoing!) professional achievements and her indefatigable leadership in the Cedar's Community. He was proud of Caroline, Lawson, and their accomplished spouses—and he was at his happiest when talking of his three grandchildren—all boys. Ted was content, a self-actualized individual.

The preponderance of you reading this *Newsletter* were touched in some way by “TO”. For those of you who did have an opportunity be personally acquainted with him, you should know he left his imprimatur on your professional DNA through his contributions to our current academic foundation not only here at UNC-CH, but far beyond. What a joy and blessing it is to be a part of his legacy!

Dorothy Pang (1991) and Peter Lee (UNC-ORTHO 1992) of San Francisco have become our newest donors to established a named fellowship to support residents' stipends in pediatric dentistry. Their \$100,000 DFNC Fellowship will brand their long-time shared practice “OPDSF”, called Orthodontics Pediatric Dentistry of San Francisco. The OPDSF Lee-Pang Fellowship will come on-line through a stock transfer and its endowment proceeds will begin to enhance residents' stipends soon.

Dorothy and Peter graduated from the School of Dentistry at the University of Texas at Houston before coming to Chapel Hill to complete their residency programs here. The apples are falling near the tree! Son Jonathan (a Colby College graduate) will attend the Rosemond School of Dentistry in Utah this fall. Son Ben is a college student at Tufts and he is considering dentistry as a career option.

Thanks to Dorothy and Peter for helping us with our goal to endow our graduate program operations. Our trajectory toward our goal continues to proceed nicely!



Wright Fellowship Fund—Onward and Upward!

Under the leadership of **Angie Baechtold (1998)** of Asheville, **Rob Moran (1997)** of Cary and an energetic Steering Committee, the Wright Fellowship Fund has seen impressive gains in '21. To date the TWF Fund has received over \$95,000 in cash with another \$159K in pledges. Thanks to all of you who have joined this initiative to honor Tim's legacy!

Based on our progress, we will soon reach our first goal to endow a fellowship to establish an indelible mark in Tim's name in the Dental Foundation of North Carolina and the University. When the fund reaches ~\$110K, the endowment proceeds will begin to flow to residents as stipend supplements. Based on our trajectory, this should occur as soon

as this fall. Great progress, y'all!

Currently since we are sitting at close to \$255,000 in cash and pledges for the Wright Fund, so our grand goal of \$400K is within grasp. The lion's share of the cash and pledges to date have come from very generous gifts/pledges from more senior alumni and friends. We need help from the younger alum cohorts—no gift or pledge is too small—please pay it forward for Timmy!

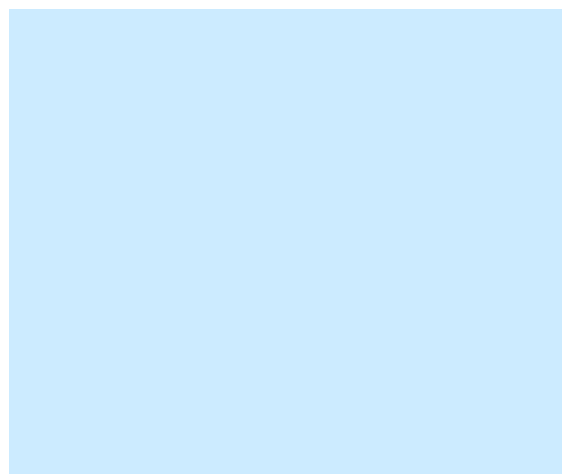
Poojan Shrestha:

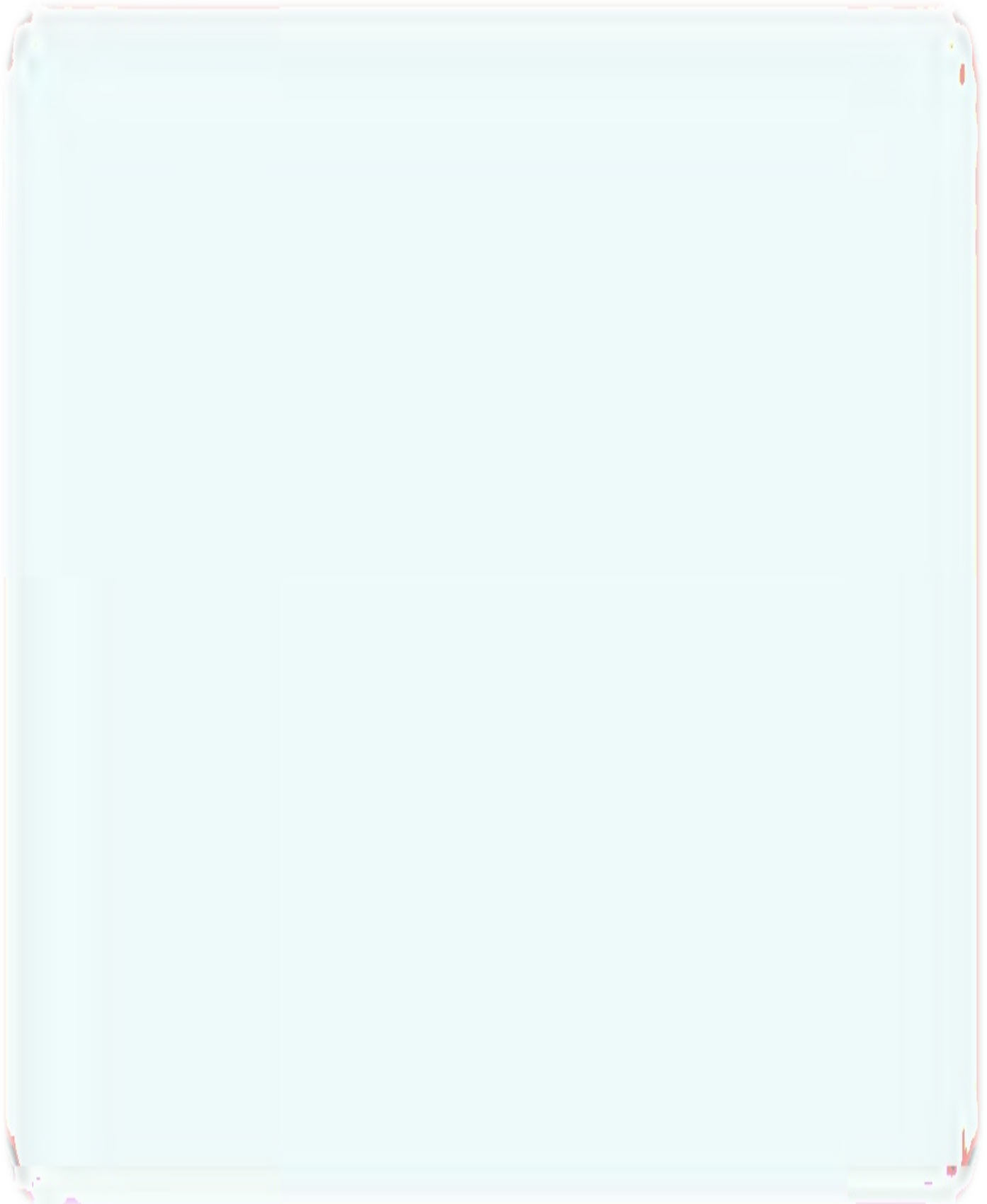
