#### **Quinonez Receives Teaching Awards**

#### UNC Granted a Blue Cross Blue Shield Foundation Grant to develop and test the Prenatal Oral Health Program (pOHP).

In the past decade, North Carolina has been a leader in oral health promotion and disease prevention for vulnerable populations. Among these programs is the Into the Mouths of Babes (IMB) that has focused on physicians delivering preventive oral health services for at risk children 0-3 years. It has been effective at increasing access to care and reducing caries related treatments.

The Baby Oral Health Program (bOHP) was first introduced in 2005 and has focused on provider education to prepare a dental workforce that is capable and willing to receive physician referrals for young children. Most recently, the Blue Cross Blue Shield Foundation of North Carolina granted the Department of Pediatric Dentistry (Rocio Quinonez, 2000) in collaboration with the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology, School of Medicine, (Dr. Kim Boggess) funds to expand on bOHP to develop pOHP (Prenatal Oral Health Program).

The goals for pOHP include enhancing existing oral health preventive strategies by focusing on educating primary health care providers to incorporate oral health into prenatal care. Data demonstrating a strong relationship between

maternal and child oral health highlights the importance of such initiatives, with this project targeting to increase oral health awareness and access to oral health care to reproductive age women and their children. An additional aim of this initiative will be to develop training materials for the dental team to use in clinical practice to assist in promoting a comprehensive health care system that optimizes oral health during pregnancy and into early childhood. The goal is that these materials will become available in late 2012 or early 2013. Our gratitude to BCBS for this partnership and we look forward to sharing what we learn as this project unfolds!

Register early and don't miss this one as it will be very topical!



#### Seasons of a Pediatric Dentist



It felt like a New Year's celebration to defend my thesis and complete my residency at UNC in the spring of 1999. Becoming Larry Dempsey's (1975) associate, the celebration continued. Larry is a great pediatric dentist, teacher and business man. James (my husband) and I were having a simple and amazing life.

Winter...My bitter winter season began when I realized that the juggle of family and profession is not easily balanced. When our daugh-

ter, Mia, was born in 2001 with medical issues, for the first time being a pediatric dentist was not the focus of my life. Due to post-op complications from her open heart surgery, we were not sure she would leave the hospital and I was not sure how I could live, not to mention practice pediatric

dentistry again. I thank God for healing Mia and I thank Larry Dempsey for standing by me with unlimited time off in 2001, assuring me everything would be okay and that I would be happy once I was able to return to the profession that I loved when Mia was better. The daily visits in the

PICU from Mike Roberts and Rocio Quinonez also helped warm the winter in my heart.

**Spring...**A time of new growth. Many of us start or grow a family the first few years out of residency. After a combination of a daily four hour commute, James and I decided that I should practice in Raleigh. The miracle of starting a new life is an amazing and happy time and the concept of opening an office from scratch seems fun and exciting. Right? No! This is when things changed. On Mia's 1<sup>st</sup> birthday the doors opened to the Wakefield office and, "yes," there was birthday cake...in the office! Mia spent many of her toddler days helping James and I oversee construction, set up computers, stock, decorate and slept many hours in the evening at the office. I think she thought but there is a profound gentle beauty. Much like you learn we lived there! After endless hours of hard work, the seeds of success were planted and we were blessed with growth.

Summer...A lot of growth. You cannot learn in school when it is enough. We all have a variety of strengths, stamina and differing intensities in the ability to multitask. With the addition of associates, partner, second location construction and increased business, I felt more

is the case with Jim Bawden and Monty Harrison. My children and the life I share with James are my greatest joys. Professionally, clinical pediatric dentistry is rewarding and I enjoy the work I do with the ABPD. # **Development Activities: Supporting Excellence and the UNC Legacy**



#### Eric Everett appointed Director of Research in Pediatric Dentistry



Eric Everett, professor in our department and a member of the Carolina Center of Genome Sciences has been appointed Director of Research in Pediatric Dentistry effective October 1, 2011. Eric has been a member of our department since 2004. He is a molecular geneticist by trade. Eric will monitor and facilitate progress of residents' MS and PhD projects; organize regular departmental research meetings and research presentations; facilitate and assist faculty and residents with their own research proposals; and assist Tim Wright with maintaining the department's scholarly activity database

The Everett laboratory's research program focuses on the identification of genes and pathways that play key roles during embryonic and postnatal development of craniofacial/oral/dental structures. this work is to identify the actual genes that directly and/or indirectly contribute to an individual's susceptibility or resistance to develop dental fluorosis and to understand the cellular roles and functions of these genes during the pathogenesis of fluorosis. A molecular understanding of the mechanisms of dental fluorosis will strengthen the scientific base underlying the efforts to improve oral health by maximize the benefits of fluoride while minimizing the risks of excessive fluoride. Fluoride can also have profound effects on bone biology. In some strains of mice fluoride induces the formation of osteoclasts, whereas in other strain fluoride acts as an anabolic agent leading to more bone formation. The Everett lab has NIH grant support to investigate the genetics of physiological responses to fluoride in bone.


